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UK: UK to consider proscribing Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps as a terrorist organisation

Reporting has suggested that Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) will be officially proscribed as a terrorist organisation by the UK in the coming weeks.¹ The IRGC is a branch of the Iranian armed forces intended to protect the political system of Iran's Islamic Republic and is known to control Iran's most destructive military capabilities; including alleged access to CBRN material and a sophisticated cyber capability. It is almost certain that the IRGC extends its influence and potential threat to the UK through a highly capable and extensive network of covert assets and proxy groups that seek to subvert and influence the stability and prosperity of the UK.

Proscribing the group would make it a criminal offence to be associated in any way with the IRGC. It is almost certain that the proscription of the IRGC would further damage UK-Iranian relations. The group

were designated as a terrorist organisation by the United States in 2019, prompting severe diplomatic backlash and a breakdown in US-Iranian relations.

It is highly likely that the Iranian threat to the UK will increase if the IRGC is proscribed. The Iranian State is known to retaliate against those who oppose or denigrate their regime.² It is unlikely that any retaliatory actions related to the IRGC in the UK would pose a significant physical threat to property. Instead, it would likely target individuals. In October 2022. Director General of MI5 Ken McCallum indicated there had been 10 Iranian plots to kidnap or kill Iranian citizens in the UK in the past 12 months.³ As of 16 January, reporting suggests that the UK Labour Party have made further demands for the group to be proscribed after the execution of British-Iranian national. Alireza Akbari, who had been accused of spying for MI6.4

If the UK government moves to proscribe the IRGC, there is a realistic possibility that UK-based organisations and individuals with ties to the Iranian regime could respond negatively to the proscription of the IRGC. This could increase the vulnerability of organisations across the UK to Iranian backed insider threat and acts of retaliation.

While a decision on the proscription of the IRGC is expected in the coming weeks, the move by a UK government to proscribe a state-backed group would be unprecedented.

UK: Man arrested following uranium found at Heathrow Airport

On 14 January, a British citizen was arrested on suspicion of terror offences after traces of uranium were detected in a shipment of scrap metal at Heathrow Airport in December 2022.⁵ The offence relates to the production or possession of radioactive material. Reports suggest a "very small" amount of uranium was detected at Heathrow Airport on a flight from Oman. The flight had allegedly originated in Pakistan.⁶ Certain uranium isotopes can be harmful to humans, and the metal itself is toxic if indested or inhaled. However, Commander Richard Smith. head of the Metropolitan Police's counterterrorism command. stated that the incident did not appear to be linked to any direct threat to the public.⁷ The investigation is ongoing.

The discovery of uranium at Heathrow Airport illustrates the security service's ability to detect Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear (CBRN) materials that could pose a threat to the



UK. While it is highly likely that terrorist actors would have the intent to conduct an attack using CBRN materials in the UK, it is highly unlikely that most UK terrorist actors would have the capability to conduct such an attack. As such, it is likely that state-sponsored actors would remain as the predominant CBRN threat to the UK.
